Auditions!

What is an Audition?

A sample performance by an Actor, Singer, Musician, Dancer, or other performer!

What happens at an audition?

The performer auditioning performs some sort of piece for the person casting the show.

Typically in Theatre this is the Director or Casting Director.

What is performed at an audition?

This is very dependent on the specific show! Often some sort of prepared piece is needed like a song or a monologue

Types of Auditions:

Musical Theatre Audition: Typically requires a cut of a song to be sung, usually 16 or 32 bars (30 or 60 seconds). Usually a song from a musical but some require pop songs.

Play Audition (Monologue): Typically requires a monologue to be read! A monologue is a solo reading from a play. Typically 60 to 90 seconds

Play Audition (Sides): Sides are short segments of text from the play. Can be just one person reading or multiple

Dance Call: Typically a part of a Musical Theatre Audition although is seen with some plays. Involves learning a short dance cut and performing it for those casting the show.

Cold Read: This is when you read the material for the first time at the audition. No preparation is needed beforehand.

Improv Audition: This is quite literally doing improv at an audition! Oftentimes it goes along with another type of audition (reading sides and doing improv, improvising a dance, ex.). Can be the entire audition, in which you show up and do a variety of improv!

Auditions Tips

- **Pick Material you are comfortable with:** You being comfortable and confident should be the number one priority. It allows you to showcase yourself well, and will help you be less nervous.
- **Be prepared:** Practice your material well. If you are supposed to be memorized, be memorized. Even if you aren't, be close to memorized. Do everything you can before the audition to get ready. It will help you be confident and will show the director that you care.
- **Read the audition announcement carefully:** Often there is information in there that may be different from your last audition. Reading it carefully ensures you will prepare the right stuff, and will not have an unexpected surprise at the audition.
- **Showcase your personality:** Pick material that shows who you are and what you offer to this show.
- **Know the show:** Read the script beforehand. Listen to the music. This will help when you pick audition material and if questions about the show are asked.
- **Show Variety:** Make different choices throughout your monologue, sing a wide range, show multiple emotions. This shows the director that you aren't a one trick pony
- **Embrace the action:** Acting Means do not talk, use your full body when performing. Be in the moment and make physical choices.
- **Arrive on Time to an Audition:** Typical "on time" means 15 minutes early. Arriving late will show you don't prioritize the show and can harm your chances.
- **Dress appropriately:** If you need to dance, wear clothes you can dance with. Follow basic school dress code. Make sure your clothes are clean and relatively nice.
- **Be friendly inside and outside the audition room:** The audition starts before you enter the room. Those checking you in will talk to the director if you are being rude.
- **Don't watch the director:** Making eye contact with the director mid audition is weird and will make them uncomfortable. Don't do it.
- It's ok to be nervous: Nerves are normal. The more you audition the less they happen but it's ok to be nervous.

Audition Misconceptions

- "I need to pick a song/monologue no one has heard of": Although it is a nice addition to have a unique song, don't make it a priority. Pick something you are comfortable with over something no one has heard before.
- "Picking "edgy" material will make me seem mature": NO! Adults do not enjoy this. It makes them uncomfortable and will negatively impact your audition.
- "I need to pick a song from the show, so they know I can sing it":

 Picking a song from the show when they do not specify it is a bad idea. It shows
 you haven't read the audition requirements. It will make you seem like you can't
 follow instructions and make you look like you think you know better than the
 casting director.
- "I should bring props or other materials to help enhance an audition": If you can not sell your performance with just your own acting, props will not help and will distract.
- "I can just go in and wing it and be fine": Being prepared for an audition shows. It shows the director that you care about this show which directors like. Being unprepared in an audition tells them that's how you will be at rehearsals and during the actual show, which is a negative thing.
- "Going big will be embarrassing": Making big choices will help you stand out and will show the director that you are not afraid to be big on stage. Going big (when it serves the material) can really help an audition
- "It doesn't matter if I do a longer cut than they ask for": Not following directions makes it seem like you didn't care enough to read the audition information or that you think you know better than the director. Audition with the amount they ask for.
- "If I audition for someone once and don't get cast, they will never cast me in the future": Not getting cast once does not mean you won't get cast again. Auditioning again after a no and then coming back shows the director you can take a no well and that you will keep trying. One no is not a no forever, it is often you were just not right for that show at that time

Improv!

What is improv?: Improv is acting without a script or a starting plan. Simply it is acting on the spot, usually with other scene partners and trying to create something that is coherent, followable and that follows your objectives (meating CROW, using variables, ex.)

What is crow?: Crow is an acronym of what you need to remember when improvising. It stands for:

Character

Relationship

Objective

Where/When

What does "Yes, and" mean?: "Yes, and" is a common phrase used in improv and is representative of what you are meant to say to your partner in an improv scene. "Yes" is said because agreement is extremely important in improv, the yes is saying yes to an idea a partner has given. The "and" part means that you are expanding on that idea and contributing an additional idea to the scene that is in agreement and adds to what they said.

What does Robot, Pirate, Ninja mean?: These 3 terms are used to describe different types of improvisers. Pirates often are first to initiate scenes, they typically make big choices and draw focus. Robots help support others in the scene, often they play the straight character and help meet the scenes goals. Ninjas swoop in with stealth, making choices without necessarily being highly visible, but when the moment is right they often steal the scene.

Is the goal of improv to be funny?: No. Although being funny in an improv scene is a nice addition, supporting those around you, and getting through the scene is more important. Comedy will happen naturally when scene partners work together, not when individuals try to be funny.

What types of improv are there?:

Short Form Improv: Typically short scenes that don't go with one another. Can have no rules or can have specific format and requirements.

Long Form Improv (Harold): A longer piece of improvised material. Can consist of initial short scenes that then inspire a series of longer scenes, but can also be one long show without initial scenes.

Improv Within a Written Work: Happens when a scripted show has moments meant for improvisation. Often this can be with the audience.

Improv Tips

- Make those in the scene with you look good: Supporting those around you is ALWAYS the top goal, if you can set them up to be funny set them up
- **Start first, think later:** Thinking is the death of improv. Go with your first instinct and don't think about it
- You don't need to always stay in the scene: Staying in the scene when you aren't needed is harmful. When it is your time to go, go!
- **Listen!:** "Bad actors act when they're speaking. Great actors act when they're listening!" Listening to
- **Raise the Stakes**: Is your character going to lose \$100 if they don't win the game, or are they going to get abducted by aliens? High risk is entertaining and engaging.
- **Don't talk constantly:** Many amateur improv scenes fail when people talk over one another or talk so much that others can't get a word in. Say what you need to to move the scene along and then let others speak.
- **Use your body:** Physicality is good and often funnier than words. Talking gets boring. Make physical choices and be big!

Resume Basics

What is a resume?: A resume is a document created and used by a person to present their previous shows, and training to someone. Typically the director of a show you are auditioning for.

Do I need a resume?: Not necessarily. Often children's theatre auditions have a resume as an optional element. However, if you have enough information to fill a resume (even a small one) it is recommended you submit one!

What should I put on my resume?:

Required:

- Your Name
- Contact Information/Parents Contact Information
- Previous Shows
- Previous Classes, training, and education (This class is one you can add!)

Optional:

- Pronouns (it's very common place nowadays and highly recommended!)
- Voice Type
- Height
- Eye/Hair Color
- Voice Training
- Dance Training
- Awards (should be relevant to theater)
- Non Show Performance Experiences (Improv Teams, Choir, specialty performances, ex.)
- Special Skills (Only ones relevant to performing. Keep it brief. Can include improv experience!)

Don't Include:

- Home Address
- Weight (This is going out of practice. But especially don't include because you are growing children who don't need to worry about their weight)
- Grammatical Errors
- Lies! (Lying is bad. Don't lie on your resume. It will end poorly)

Music Book Basics

What is a music book?: A collection of musical theatre songs, that you would feel comfortable singing at an audition.

When is this used?: In Musical Theatre auditions it is sometimes required to bring your book with you in case they want you to sing an additional song. It is also just generally good to have to help keep track on the songs you have and make sure you have a wide variety of songs in your back pocket!

Is this required?: Probably not. But it is a helpful tool to have a good idea to start working on it if you are interested in auditioning for musicals!

What should I include in my music book?:

Required:

- Multiple Musical Theatre songs
- Name of those songs
- Title of the shows they are from
- Sheet music for those songs

Optional:

- Pop/Disney Songs
- Year the songs were written
- Composer of the songs
- Type of song (Ballad, uptempo)

Don't Include:

- Songs you don't know
- Songs you don't like to sing
